

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Old Stone Gathers No Moss

Old Stone Farm, named for the Revolutionary War era cemetery located in its center, has grown and evolved along with the Gruber family who purchased it in 1991.

Owners Mark and Mary Gruber initially followed in the footsteps of Mark's father Alfred, a longtime Christmas tree grower, with a cut-your-own Christmas tree operation on the property. Over time as their family grew, they had added rows of grapes for the local wine industry, a horse boarding operation, and row crops.

"My family teases me that I never sit down," says Mary Gruber.

However, Mary wasn't looking for more work when she and her college-bound daughter decided to visit a nearby cider conference in 2008. In fact, she didn't even realize the cider being discussed that day was hard (alcoholic) cider. But after an afternoon of learning about the budding cider industry, she was intrigued by this relatively untapped niche in the alcohol market.

Coincidentally around that same time, husband Mark had been traveling to England for work and had grown fond of the English style hard cider. Compared to much of the hard

cider mass produced in the United States, English style cider is known for being dryer and less carbonated.

Together the Grubers decided the time was right to launch a new business venture on the farm: producing their own version of English style hard cider.

"Few were making it," recalls Mary. "Alcohol consumption research indicated drinkers were looking for the next new thing and we saw the opportunity."

In order to make the cider, they needed cider apples. Apples used for cider tend to be different than the ones grown for fresh eating because they possess a higher sugar content needed for alcohol production and also possess levels of acidities and tannins necessary for a quality end product. To achieve the refined flavors the Grubers were aiming for, they knew they needed to have a consistent supply of heirloom apples, a difficult task.

"We found that it was next to impossible to source the type and quantity of apples we need so we decided to grow our own," says the Gruber's son Evan, who leads cider fermentation, sales and marketing on the farm.

Cider production didn't come right away, though. Switching out the grape vines for apple trees, and renovating their historic bank barn to serve as a production facility and tasting room took money, time and work. Lots of it.

Everyone in the family pitched in with demolition and reconstruction. In addition, daughter Elise built the wooden tables out of reclaimed barn siding, Mark worked on the finances and equipment, while Mary and Evan took on the challenges of starting an orchard.

“There was a learning curve for sure,” says Mary. “Pruning and spraying apples took some study. Some cider apple varieties from a 100 years ago are ‘uncooperative’ and don't have the same disease resistance as more modern cultivars.”

The Grubers currently grow over 20 varieties of Old English and heirloom American apples with evocative names like Roxbury Russett, Harrison, Virginia Crab and Stoke Red, varieties the Founding Fathers would recognize.

“Blending cider is an art,” says Mary. “We aim for a nice mouthfeel and just the right amount of dryness.”

As their cider business has grown, so has word-of-mouth.

“We have four to five ciders on tap and rotate them every couple of months to keep things new for our customers,” says Evan.

In a few short years, Old Stone Cider has become a popular destination for locals and cider enthusiasts from around the region with production consistently selling out by the end of December, one of their busiest months. It turns out their Christmas tree customers love to visit the cider tasting room, incorporating a bit of cider into their holiday traditions.

It's not just the cider and trees that draw visitors to Old Stone Farm. In warmer months, the Grubers partner with local food trucks and area musicians to create a full agritainment experience for their customers.

“People like to sit outside in the loafing area with their cider and food and listen to live music,” says Mary. “Our township and the Lewisville community have really embraced us and supported the growth of our farm.”



Farmers of the Year:

The Gable Family of Conebella Farm



Dairy farming has never been an easy way to make a living. However, for those with an entrepreneurial spirit, strong work ethic and the ability to navigate changing consumer tastes, there can be great reward.

The Gable family of Conebella Farm in Elverson, led by Don and Pam Gable, are no stranger to changes in the dairy market. That said, this 5th generation farm family has found success with their award-winning range of locally made dairy products including cheeses, yogurt, smoothies, raw milk and butter.

“The reason our farm is still here is the diversity of our business,” says Don.

Nominated for the county’s Farmers of the Year Award by the Chester-Delaware Farm Bureau, the Gables are not only ambassadors for the Ayrshire cows they raise, but for the county’s local dairy industry as well.

“We are honored to recognize the Gables for their ability to rise above difficult market conditions and thrive as part of our county’s top industry: agriculture,” says Chester County Commissioner Michelle Kichline.


A TRADITION OF INNOVATION

Conebella Farm’s current success did not come overnight; it is the sum of the good business planning, conservation efforts and the talents of generations of Gables.

In 1938, Harold Gable brought the first Ayrshire cows to the farm. Ayrshires, a rare breed in Chester County, produce milk with a high butterfat content relative to other breeds. This special quality lends flavor and richness to the award-winning dairy products the farm has become known for.

Harold’s son Charlie continued to build their Ayrshire herd and introduced innovative, environmentally friendly farming practices like terracing and waterways the family still uses today. He also preserved the farm, serving as a champion for open space preservation throughout the county.

Don and Pam, the current generation of Gables at the farm’s helm, knew they also had to make changes so Conebella would remain a viable business for their sons one day. Selling value-added dairy products directly to the public would be their path forward.



TASTE OF SUCCESS

The Gables' first step was selling raw milk to the public from a small store on their farm, an expansion of their milk sales to a local dairy cooperative. Energized by the response from their new customers, Don and Pam collaborated with two area cheese makers to develop a range of antibiotic-free, preservative-free, fresh and aged cheeses.

"It's important for us and for our customers that there is nothing extra in our products," says Pam.

Their cheeses have earned them a loyal foodie following and industry praise as well.

In their first-ever appearance at the PA Farm Show Cheese Competition in 2020, Conebella Farm's sharp cheddar won first prize in the Cheddar, Colby and Monterey Jack category and third in Best in Show. Their cheese curds won third in the Cheddar, Colby and Monterey Jack category.

Today you can purchase Conebella dairy products at their on-farm store, on their website, and at several area farmers markets, local festivals, and at over 40 retail accounts across the region.

The farm and the Gable family have continued to change and grow. Sons Josh, Tyler, Kevin, and Kevin's wife Emily all have roles to play in the success of the farm and contribute in different ways. Don's mother Josie still cares for the calves and helps with the lawn mowing.

"I think my father and grandfather would be proud to see Conebella Farm today," says Don.

From Their Cow to Your Kitchen

People often have questions about the way their food is produced, but after experiencing COVID-19 supply interruptions, many of us are also more curious about how food gets processed, distributed and finally arrives on our table. The dairy industry is one segment of agriculture that has experienced a lot of disruption; in addition to facing many challenges and historically low milk prices.

Why has milk been difficult to find in stores, yet farmers have had to dump milk?

The American food supply system is extremely efficient, but unanticipated pandemic-related disruptions this past spring brought unique challenges that made it difficult to find certain food items, including dairy.

Jayne Sebright, the Executive Director of the Center for Dairy Excellence, acknowledges the difficulty many consumers had at one point or another finding milk at the grocery store even though dairy is one of Pennsylvania’s top commodities. “There were issues with both dairy processing and grocery store purchasing that had consumers looking at empty shelves. It was the perfect storm.”

With large dairy customers like schools and restaurants no longer purchasing their usual volumes of milk, some dairy





How can I support Pennsylvania dairy farmers now?

Buy real milk and other dairy products!

Laura England, Director of the Bureau of Market Development at Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, says, “Buying real milk and other dairy products at the grocery store is something many consumers are already doing.”

She explains that milk is highly perishable; therefore, it is collected, processed and distributed as efficiently as possible.

In the state of Pennsylvania, milk is required to be delivered to the processor within 72 hours from the time milking takes place on the farm. It is standard dairy industry practice to deliver milk and other dairy products as locally as possible for both quality and cost-effectiveness. This means that if you buy milk at your local grocery store, it is likely to have come from not too far away.

But how can you be sure you are supporting Pennsylvania dairy farmers?

England says, “Look for the PA Preferred® logo or for the number 42 on your milk carton. The first two numbers of the codes stamped on milk cartons identifies the state where the milk was processed. Pennsylvania’s number is 42, therefore, milk with a plant code beginning with ‘42’ means the milk is processed in Pennsylvania and sourced predominately from Pennsylvania dairy farms.”

Chester County Commissioner Josh Maxwell notes, “Our Chester County dairies and farms also use their milk to produce an amazing selection of award-winning cheeses, ice creams and yogurts, which can be bought directly from the farms. I encourage everyone to try them – not just to support local businesses, but because they are all delicious!”

cooperatives and processors were stuck with a surplus they were unable to rapidly repackage and transport for sale to individual customers.

Typically, these kinds of institutional customers purchase milk in a variety of quantities that can be significantly smaller (e.g. single-serve) or larger (e.g. 5-10 gallons bags made to fit into dispensing machines) than our standard gallon or half-gallon containers. Without the right packaging readily available, it took processors a few weeks to order and receive the residential-sized containers.

At the same time, grocery stores continued ordering their usual supply of milk, not fully anticipating the duration of institutional closures and additional household consumption they would be facing. So while there was milk available, the stores did not have it in stock yet.

This disruption caused some cooperatives and processors to ask farmers to dump the surplus milk on their fields (temporary environmental allowances were given) as a way to get rid of it until they could get the right packaging and grocery store orders increased.

Sebright explains: “Whether those farmers use a cooperative to market their milk or they sell directly to a processor, the economic impact is typically spread amongst the farmer-collective so that no single farmer bears the entire financial loss. Notwithstanding, as dairy farmers continued to milk their cows they were faced with the heart-breaking knowledge that some of that milk would go to waste. It was a frustrating time for everyone involved.”



Nottingham's Kaitlin Bell Makes Farm Show History

Kaitlin Bell, an 18-year-old from Nottingham, Pa., made Pennsylvania Farm Show history January as the first person in the fair's 104 years to win Beef Cattle Supreme in both the heifer and the bull livestock showing categories.

The Farm Show judges evaluated Kaitlin and her fellow competitors on their ability to guide their animals in the ring, while scoring their cattle on specific traits like muscling and posture.

"I started crying, I was so overwhelmed," says Kaitlin of her Farm Show experience. "My parents were crying and screaming, and ran into the ring. People try for years and never get to win even one division."

"Young people like Kaitlin Bell are the future of Pennsylvania's \$135.7 billion agriculture industry," said Pennsylvania Agriculture Secretary Russell Redding. "We are proud of Kaitlin and the example she set during Farm Show for excellence in knowledge and care of her animals, as well as confidence and a tenacious competitive spirit. She represents a bright future for our industry."

Good bovine genetics was only part of the story; hard work and family support over the years played an important role.



"Leading up to the Farm Show, my brother David and I spent hours every night after school to get the cattle fed with their individually mixed rations and turned out to their respective pastures. The most time consuming part was the daily stall cleaning to keep their hair soft and silky," recalls Kaitlin.

As a child, Kaitlin showed an early affinity for animals. Parents David Sr. and Tiffany encouraged their children to join 4-H, a worldwide youth development organization with an active Chester County chapter.

"Penn State Extension's 4-H Youth Development program is open to all youth ages 5-18 years old, no matter their background or where they live," says Logan Hall, 4-H Extension Educator. "We offer a wide variety of project areas including animal science, food science and STEM. Youth can even lease a large animal as a 4-H project."

"We see firsthand the amount of responsibility, decision making, leadership and dedication it takes to prepare a large animal to be handled and safely shown," says Tiffany. "It's almost like the kids that participate in showing have an 'unfair' advantage over those that don't."

"There's so much to learn and you make amazing friends," says Kaitlin. "I've learned the value of hard work, a deep respect for animals and the importance of balancing the books because feed is not cheap."

Kaitlin's family, especially her brother, tends the cattle so she can still compete when she returns home from college on

breaks. Caring for these animals is a significant commitment of time and money they are happy to make.

“I always tell kids involved in livestock showing to remember to thank your family,” says Kaitlin.

Says David Sr., “Farming is not your typical job, but I wouldn’t trade the long days and sometimes short nights because of the family togetherness. There are so many things in life that pull a family in different directions, but farming is something that pulls you together.”

Kaitlin, now a junior by credits at Kansas State University (thanks to a dual enrollment program with Oxford Area High School and Cecil College) is pursuing a major in Agricultural Business with a minor in Animal Science.

“In 2050, we are anticipating a world population of 9 billion people meaning we need to figure out how to feed 2 billion more people than we are now. There is opportunity in increasing crop yields and efficiently raising livestock. There is also opportunity in raising organic, grass fed beef. There is a market for everybody,” says Kaitlin.

With agricultural champions like Kaitlin Bell at the helm, we are optimistic, too.

Farmers Rise to the COVID Challenge



The COVID-19 pandemic has challenged our nation in so many profound ways. Agriculture, an essential business in every way, has been no exception.

Owner-operators of small, suburban produce farms to commodity crop farms on thousands of acres have had to rethink their business models and add extra safety measures for their families, staff and customers, often requiring extra expertise and expense.

For egg farmers Deb Ellis and Duane Rehmeier of Highspire Hills Farm in Glenmoore, the pandemic cost them a majority of their restaurant clients and a large part of their income. Despite increasing demand from their grocery store clients like Crop's Fresh Marketplace and Kimberton Whole Foods, they were left with a large number of eggs they were unable to sell and feed bills to pay.

"Chickens don't read the paper; they don't stop laying in a pandemic," says Ellis.

With help from some partner organizations, Ellis and Rehmeier looked to social media. They had always had a presence online, but hadn't needed to focus on it much. After a couple well-received Facebook posts about their egg surplus,


the couple were surprised to receive an avalanche of new customers to their small, on-farm store.

"Normally, we might have a few cars a day, but now we have upwards of 40 to 50 cars coming down the driveway to buy our eggs," says Ellis. "We are grateful to all of our friends and neighbors for their support and are thankful that we have the ability to support our local community."

Farmers markets, a traditional marketing channel for farmers for centuries, have also changed in response to COVID-19.

Many now require customers to order online and pay in advance to avoid customers congregating in and around vendor booths. The increased social distancing is good for public health, but it has put a stop to browsing and face-to-face conversations with customers, both proven to increase farm sales.

In response, farmers market vendors Sammy Smenkowski and Zac Heacock of Full Circle CSA in Glenmoore chose to open up more spots in their CSA program (community supported agriculture). In a CSA program, customers pay in advance to receive farm products throughout the growing season.

“We nearly doubled the size of our CSA from last season to not only attempt to meet high demand and feed as many people in our community as possible, but to make up for lost revenue due to markets running very differently and restaurants being closed or limited with sales,” says Smenkowski.

“We have and will continue to use strict good hygiene protocol and to come up with creative, safe ways to get food to people’s homes,” she adds.

Increased safety is the name of the game for small operations like Full Circle up to and including large operations employing hundreds like mushroom giant Pietro Industries in Kennett.

The mushroom industry has always been an innovator when it comes to designing and implementing safety protocols, but the pandemic has caused them to add additional measures beyond their usual practices. It also amplified their ongoing workforce shortage and caused the loss of major clients like restaurant, university and cruise ship food service companies.

Chris Alonzo of Pietro Industries in Kennett Square (and Ag Council Board President) has seen a positive employee response to the new measures on his farm including TV monitors playing safety messages in Spanish, increased

conversation with employees about their health and his new t-shirt campaign.

The shirts feature a Super Man style logo with a mushroom in the center and the slogan “I’m feeding America, please stay 6 feet away.”

“I wanted to help keep my employees safe and remind our larger community that agriculture employees are heroes, performing essential jobs that deserve our recognition and appreciation,” says Alonzo.

As many farmers will tell you, COVID-19 is far from the only crisis they have had to manage over the years to keep our grocery shelves fully stocked. Unpredictable weather, employee shortages and invasive pests are no picnic either.

“If nothing else, this pandemic has proven that a robust local food system is a necessity, not a luxury, and it deserves our steadfast support,” says Chester County Commissioners’ Chair Marian Moskowitz. “Remember, when you buy Chester County grown farm products today, you are helping to insure farmers will be able to keep growing for us tomorrow. We are all in this together.”
